### **GATHER IN WORSHIP**

The mission of the Gather in Worship Committee of Session (GIW) is to facilitate, support, and oversee all aspects of the congregational worship experience, to enhance fellowship, facilitate a warm and welcoming environment for all visitors, attract and educate inquirers, receive new members, and to promote Fletcher Hills Presbyterian Church to the surrounding community in a positive manner.

In the first half of 2019, the committee was chaired by Elder Lisa Phipps, who was accompanied by Elders Jim Hancock and Dan Decker. In mid-year, Lisa and Jim completed their terms on Session and rotated off. Their energy and creativity are greatly missed. Also at mid-year, Elder Tom Guest accepted a two-year term to return and is now chairing our Gather in Worship committee for the 2019-2020 year. Dan Decker continues to faithfully serve on our committee and is expected to assume the role of chair this summer.

#### **WORSHIP & MUSIC**

We are very blessed to have Sarah Suhonen as our Music Director as she leads our volunteer instrumentalists and vocalists, featuring a blend of traditional hymns and contemporary songs in our weekly services. There aren't many who have such talent in both styles and we are very thankful for her leadership, her musical gifts, and her heart for worship. We are also honored to have Patrick Walders as our accompanist, preparing us for worship with his introits, and sending us out to "the world" with his postludes, as well as his other contributions. Thank you to our Welcome Table volunteers who provide such a warm greeting to all our members and visitors every week.

In February, the Session hosted its Annual Congregational Meeting and Luncheon. Thank you for the volunteers who helped set up and clean up, as well as pick up and serve our deli sandwich lunch.

Right on the heels of that, we were honored to host the February Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of San Diego at FHPC. Thank you to Karen Hoss who used her experience as our Memorials Coordinator to provide for a catered Italian dinner as well as coordinating a team of volunteers to set up, serve, and clean up in our Fellowship Hall. Thanks to all the volunteers, too!

In the spring, the Deacons began coordinating our annual Easter Breakfast. Thank you to all who helped prepare the food as well as those who helped set up and clean up.

#### **LOOKING AHEAD**

It is a joy to serve this congregation as we worship God together! We gratefully thank the many volunteers who generously give of their time and talent to create an awesome worship experience for us all, to the glory of God! ### **GROW IN FAITH**

The Grow In Faith Committee of Session (GIF) is comprised of three voting Elders and three staff liaisons, Pastor Kevin Womack, Director of Faith Formation & Mission Bridget Meckley, and Director of Children and Student Ministries Kyle Keys. Together, we work to discern and plan faith formation activities for all ages. These included Small Group Bible studies, children's Sunday School, adult classes, multi-generational events like the Fall Retreat, special programs, and Student Ministries.

#### **CHILDREN MINISTRY**

In 2019, our programs included opportunities for all ages of children. Infant care, a preschool program, and Sunday School classes for children in kindergarten through fifth grade were offered.

As always, one of our most impactful annual events for children was Vacation Bible School. This year's theme was "Roar: Life is Wild, God is Good". Approximately 120 children and about 65 volunteers participated in the event. VBS continues to be an excellent form of outreach to our community and a blessing to all the children and volunteers who participate. The 2019 activities for children also included a family movie night with our Preschool and special children's programming and events for Easter and Christmas.

#### STUDENT MINISTRY

God, Faith, and Life... Titus... Revelation... Goals and Fears... and Bible History... These were among the topics that Kyle and his volunteers covered with our students in 2019. Weekly Kaleo mid-week gatherings, Sunday morning Coffee Hour, game nights, Summer Camp, VBS, service opportunities, Kaleo Turkey Championship, Christmas on the Prado, and Winter Camp were just a few of the events our students participated in.

#### ADULT FAITH FORMATION

#### **Weekly Adult Education Classes**

- The in-depth, verse by verse Bible study on Sunday mornings focused on Numbers.
- The Monday morning Women's Bible Group studied books in the "Remarkable Women of Faith" series by Elizabeth George.
- The Weekly Precept class offered an in-depth study on the book of Hebrews.

#### **Small Groups**

In 2019, our sermon-based Small Groups continued with four 8-week sessions. For the past 12 years this has proven to be a valuable way to dive deeper into the word of God using questions from each week's sermon while continuing to share life with our friends at church. The groups met in a variety of locations, including homes and on our church campus.

#### **Multi-Generation Activities**

A well-received revamp of the Fall Retreat was a welcome change. We enjoyed time away and the beauty of Lake Morena County Park. There were a number of participants who brought trailers, tents, and RV's while others used the on-site cabins. It was a great time of fellowship, rest, and rejuvenation.

### **GO IN MISSION**

The Go in Mission Committee of Session (GIM) has had an exciting year — seeing partnerships strengthened, developing new relationships, and benefitting from the leadership of the Director of Formation & Mission. Bridget Meckley served on the committee as an elder and continued to work with the committee even when her term ended. We appreciate her dedication to FHPC's work to reach out to our community and beyond. Her transition to the Director of Formation & Mission (DFM) in July was seamless for our committee. With her help, the committee has been able to move forward with many plans for neighborhood mission. Additionally, the committee would like to thank Jonathan Owens who served as a member and then chair of the committee through the end of his term in June 2019. We'd also like to thank Jeff Bennett who served as the Deacon liaison through the end of June. In July, Karina Westra stepped up as chair and continues to serve alongside Justine Mancuso.

Early in 2019, Go in Mission introduced the congregation to Children of the Nations (COTN), an organization that works in some of the poorest nations to empower children in Jesus' name. In March, Cheryl Cuthbertson joined us for a luncheon and presented the work that COTN is specifically doing in Haiti. Ude Ohuche is the COTN representative for our area and has joined us for worship a few times. Last summer several of you chose a child to sponsor from the COTN site in Haiti. At the end of September, we assembled hygiene Smile Packs, which were sent to the children in the program in Haiti. We look forward to continuing our collaboration with this great organization. *Your contributions to the General Fund make it possible for us to support COTN's vital work in Haiti.* 

With the hiring of the DFM, Go in Mission was able to move forward with plans to be more intentional in FHPC's neighborhood. One of the most exciting developments is our growing relationship with the Bethlehem Food Pantry. In August, Justine and Karina served at a "regular" distribution Saturday; the following week, almost 30 people from the congregation served at a "commodities" Saturday. A few of you have started to serve at the pantry monthly. At the end of the year, we were able to provide them with a financial gift; we just learned that our gift will constitute about a third of their budget for the year. *Your giving to the General Fund makes it possible for us to bless them in this way—thanks!* 

Go in Mission focused on a few smaller, but still valuable, projects as we moved into the fall. In the Narthex of the Sanctuary there is now a station for you to assemble packs to keep in your car and pass out to any people in need who you encounter while driving. We plan to keep these supplies available, so please make use of them and re-supply as needed. In addition to the new partnerships we started, we continue to support organizations we've built relationships with through the years. These include: Care House, Baja Presbyterian Missions, and Presbyterian Urban Ministries. Along with financial gifts, many of you give of your time and talents to these groups as well. In October, the Go in Mission committee attended a workshop called Q Commons at Crosspointe Life Church in La Mesa. This is a group that gathers not only church leaders but also people from across the community who are working to address the needs of the most vulnerable in East County.

One of Go in Mission's priorities for 2019 was to get more involved with our preschool—a mission opportunity right on our campus. At Thanksgiving, people from the congregation prepped and served at the preschool's annual celebration. This allowed the teachers to remain with their students and enjoy a little food as well. *Thanks to those who served!* 

As we begin a new year and a new decade, Go in Mission is excited about what God is doing in us and through us. We look forward to continuing our work with COTN, the Bethlehem Food Pantry, and our preschool. We will also be developing new partnerships. Furthermore, with our small groups adding a mission track to the opportunities for the congregation, we are excited to see what develops!

### **ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE**

The Administration Committee of Session handles the departments of Facilities, Personnel, and Finance. The committee members are Daniel Dugan (Chair), Daniel Kingsbury, Tom Burgeson, and staff/volunteer liaisons Jean Service and Tom Difiore. Although the committee welcomed new member Tom Burgeson in July, we would also like to recognize all the hard work of former committee member and Chair Tanner Rodriguez.

#### **FACILITIES**

Part of the Administration Committee's responsibilities is to oversee the maintenance of the FHPC campus, evaluate and renew contracts for services such as phones, internet, and copier use, and review requests and offer use of our facility to our community partners. A big thank you goes out to our Volunteer Work Crew who regularly meet and endeavor to keep our campus looking amazing (including tackling the lower Witherspoon hillside to keep the weeds knocked down and prevent the foliage from growing over the city sidewalks). Regular contributors on this crew are Tom Burgeson, Glenn Carson, Tom Difiore, Daniel Kingsbury, Scott Norton, Kim Poirier, Ray Pekrul, Jim Reisweber, Milt & Vicki Takahashi, and Walter Werlemann. Thanks again; we couldn't do this without you!

#### Several facilities projects were completed in 2019:

- The entire campus was re-lamped with LED lights, including the Sanctuary
- We were able to re-light and re-lamp the inside of the Steeple (the nights are brighter now with FHPC's Beacon of Hope shining over Fletcher Hills once more!)

- The chancel floor was refinished
- Numerous Plumbing and HVAC repairs were completed
- We replaced the paper folding machine in the Church Office

Overall, the annual Facilities budget was exceeded in 2019. Total spending was \$4,693 over the budget, but that overage included over \$24,000 in repayment of the Solar panel loan back to the Endowment Fund.

#### **PERSONNEL & FINANCE**

The Administration Committee is responsible for reviewing FHPC personnel, updating job descriptions, providing evaluations, and approving any new hires to the FHPC staff. In addition, the Administration Committee reviews and renews insurance contracts and recommends when staff members are due a pay increase.

This past year we saw a few changes to the staff. We were able to extend a permanent staff position to Dr. Patrick Walders as our Accompanist. We were blessed to close out the search for the Director of Formation & Mission and welcomed Bridget Meckley onto the staff in July. Finally, we were able to hire Jean Service into the role of Church Administrator. In this role, Jean now covers both Administration and Bookkeeping responsibilities. Due to the DFM position and the Church Administrator position being filled mid-way through the year, Personnel was able to underrun the 2019 budget. This underrun is not expected in 2020 as we are now fully staffed again.

### PRESCHOOL REPORT

It is so hard to concisely communicate the ways God has shown up in our preschool, with our staff, and how God's consistent love and care are present on our campus. But, enjoy this TOP TEN LIST for a little glimpse into our year!

10) We're famous! - 9) Lead teachers have the opportunity to create and craft a curriculum that is age appropriate and engaging to the students in their class. Each week, the classroom curriculum includes a theme, age-appropriate classroom activities, learning objectives, academic and kindergarten readiness activities, as well as opportunities for the students to develop self-help, social, and emotional skills (and have fun while doing it!). In addition to creating a safe and fun early learning environment, kindergarten readiness is at the core of all we do here.
- 8) Fletcher Hills Presbyterian Preschool maintains a great reputation in the community, and along with a good name there is typically a wait list to get in. We maintain wait lists for most of our classrooms here. In total, we serve over 100 families and we have around 115 children enrolled in our care.
- 7) Mrs. Hanks began working at Fletcher Hills Presbyterian Preschool in 1973, when she was 18 years old, and was a consistent part of our preschool program until retiring in June 2019. Mrs. Hanks devoted 46 years of love, care, and education to the children in her class and although we were sad to say goodbye, we are all so thankful for the decades of service Mrs. Hanks gave to us here at the preschool! We are a better school because of Mrs. Hanks' love and dedication.
- 6) It may have taken a few years, but we finally embraced one aspect of modern technology at the preschool by introducing a digital time clock for our staff. A few of our classrooms consistently use technology when introducing new themes, concepts, or even new songs. Ideally, we would love to have an iPad in each classroom for lesson planning, research, and to use while introducing new ideas or as visual aids for new concepts.
- 5) Teacher Appreciation Week is always a highlight at our preschool! Honoring the 17 teachers and staff is easy when you have quality, loving caregivers and teachers like we have here! In 2019, we took the staff to The Rancho Bernardo Inn for brunch and an afternoon spa treatment for our Teacher Appreciation outing. Any ideas where we should go in 2020? ©
- 4) Partnering with the Director of Children Ministries and the Director of Formation & Mission, Preschool participated in the Family Movie Night event in October 2019. It was a fantastic, fun, and free family-friendly event complete with a huge inflatable movie screen, fresh popcorn, and space for families to enjoy a movie together outdoors! This definitely won't be the last movie night we host!
- 3) Preschool holds chapel monthly, where the whole school gathers in the chapel to sing, hear stories, pray, and learn together. We are thankful for Mr. Kyle's consistent presence and teaching at chapel. The kiddos sure love Mr. Kyle and we are glad that he is a familiar face to them if/when they visit the church on Sunday mornings.
- 2) One aspect of working with early childhood education professionals is that there are different roles and responsibilities that each staff member holds. Some teachers are Lead Teachers, holding a fully qualified teaching spot while others are Associate Teachers, serving in a helping role to the teacher. In 2019 we were so proud to offer two fully

qualified Associate Teachers a Lead Teacher role here at the preschool! Watching these two teachers complete their required coursework, grow and learn from the staff they worked under here, and then feel confident and comfortable to move up and become Leads themselves was really beautiful. We are so proud of each of our staff members for their commitment to excellence in early childhood education and for providing the highest quality care to our preschoolers and their families.

1) Fletcher Hills Presbyterian Preschool continues to be a community where children, families, and staff pray, learn, and grow together! 58 years and still going strong!

### **DEACONS REPORT**

The Board of Deacons has had the pleasure of serving this congregation in many ways this year. We are thankful for the opportunity to serve our church family when needs arise.

Under **Gather in Worship**, our Communion Committee, consisting of Glenn Carson and Judi Ravetti for the first half of the year, and Glenn Carson and Vicki Takahashi for the second half, was responsible for Communion set-up and service each week. They also sent reminder emails each week to all who had signed up to serve. Many Deacons and Elders, past and present, were called upon to serve Communion in worship and to some of our Friends at Home. Our Memorials Committee, Paul Williams and Judi Ravetti, was always available to assist Karen Hoss with whatever help was needed when hosting memorials here at the church. Coordinating the beautiful Christmas and Easter decorations and changing the banners is the job of the Decorations Coordinator. This year, Gloria Johnson served the first half of the year, and Rod Smith the second. The Hospitality Coordinator, first Tony Phipps and then Larry Nelson, made sure the coffee was hot and the doughnuts were fresh each week. They worked with a dedicated set of volunteers to make that happen.

Under **Grow in Faith**, Siobhan Warren and Jean Nelson looked out for our Friends in Need. They coordinated meal trains when requested, Prayer Chain updates, and the distribution of prayer quilts to those in need of a little comfort from their church family. Richard Williams, and then Milt Takahashi, coordinated our Friends at Home program. Deacons regularly checked in with their Friends, calling, visiting, sending cards, and serving Communion. This keeps members who can no longer attend regularly connected to their church family. Easter Breakfast was served to approximately 150 people. The **Executive Board** was comprised of Sara Wildman and then Laurie Decker as moderator, Laurie Decker and then Larry Nelson as Vice Moderator, and Danielle Bennett and then Siobhan Warren as Secretary/Treasurer. We have been able to lead our meetings and bless those who call Fletcher Hills Presbyterian Church their home in 2019. It has been a blessing to serve God in all of these ways.
